


VAMPIRES DONT WEAR POLKA DOTS Pre-reading Activities

Welcome to Bailey Elementary!

- Bailey Elementary School is named after the fictional town of Bailey City. *Vampires Don't Wear Polka Dots* doesn't say how Bailey City got its name. Learn how your school and local town or city got their names and then brainstorm how Bailey City and Bailey Elementary may have gotten their names.
- The third graders at Bailey Elementary are getting a new teacher. Have you ever had a substitute teacher or a new teacher? How did that make you feel?
- Some of the kids at Bailey Elementary thought it was funny to play practical jokes on other people. What do you think about practical jokes? Are they okay? What might be some things someone could do if something they thought was funny goes too far?
- The Bailey School Kids work together as friends to solve mysteries in their school and town. Mostly, they get along. But sometimes they don't. What makes a good friend a good friend (what are the attributes of a good

friend)? How might good friends work together? What might good friends do if they have a disagreement?

Try these activities with the words below:


Have a word race. Call out a word and let students race to find the word in a chapter.



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Chapter 1 Comprehension Discussion Questions

Before reading chapter one:

Mrs. Jeepers, the new teacher, tells the kids they need to know a few rules. What do you think her rules might be? What are examples of school rules? How are rules different than laws? What are some laws? Who is responsible for making sure rules and laws are kept? Make If you were a teacher, what do you think would be appropriate and fair rules for a classroom? If you were in charge, what rules and laws would you make?

After reading chapter one:

The third graders at Bailey Elementary school are getting a new teacher.

What happened to their former teacher? ccss.ela-literacy.rl.3.1

How do you think the kids felt while waiting to meet their new teacher? Why? ccss.ela-literacy.rl.3.2

What did Melody mean when she said a teacher had muscles the size of beach balls? ccss.ela-literacy.l.3.3

Their new teacher is from another country. What are reasons that people move, or relocate, to another town, city, or country?

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CHAPTER ONE

In *Vampires Don't Wear Polka Dots*, Mrs. Jeepers grew up in a castle. European castles were built with inner and outer walls called baileys. The great hall was used for meetings, meals, and entertainment. The safest inner part of a castle was the keep. Tall towers built into walls, or turrets, were used to keep watch. Moats, a metal grate over the door called a port-cullis, and drawbridges kept out invaders.

A trip to the library or Internet will help you find out more about castles. Type in *types of castles* or *famous castles* to find out some interesting things.

Things to try:

Design your own castle on the back of this page, labeling at least four parts. Color the outer bailey green and the inner bailey your favorite color.

Use the paragraph above to answer these questions:

- 1. Why were moats, ditches filled with water, dug around some castles?
- 2. Why were turrets built as part of castles?

3. For research: find out why some castle walls had small slits in them.

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Chapter 2 and 3 Comprehension Discussion Questions



After reading chapter two:

Eddie and Melody find out their new teacher is moving into a spooky house. Why do you think the kids think the Clancy Estate is spooky? How do you think the Clancy Estate got its name? ccss.ela-literacy.rl.3.3
The character of Count Dracula is from a famous book written by Bram Stoker in 1897. What information do the kids use from that famous story to start suspecting their teacher might have something to do with that folklore character? ccss.ela-literacy.rl.3.1

After reading chapter three:

Melody thinks Eddie was terrified. How do you know when someone is terrified? How do you know someone is happy? Sad?

Howie dares Eddie and Melody to prove they're not afraid. What is a dare and do you think they are a good idea?

On pages 36-37 and on 42-43 there are very few words used. Why do you think the author chose not to include many words on those pages? CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.RL.3.7

The kids draw a conclusion on page 39. What other kinds of conclusions have the kids made and what information did they use to make those conclusions?

After reading chapter four:

Were your predictions right from the end of chapter three?

Mrs. Jeepers tells the kids things she was taught as a child. Do you think the grown-ups in your life were taught different things from what you are learning about behavior? Interview a grown-up to find out if what they learned—and how they learned—is different.

The kids are eating in the school cafeteria. What are your favorite lunch foods? If you were planning meals for the school what would you plan? Make a menu for the week.

Ben challenges Eddie while they're in the cafeteria. What advice would you give Eddie?

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Chapter 5 Comprehension Discussion Questions:

After reading chapter five:

Howie uses research for a possible plan to prove whether or not their teacher is a vampire. Do you think it's a good plan?

What does Eddie do when his teacher starts sneezing? What advice would you give to Eddie?

Why do you think Mrs. Jeepers took Eddie to the hallway? What do you think happened?

What do you think happens the next day at school? Do you think Eddie will keep his promise?

Do you think Mrs. Jeepers's brooch was magic? Or was it the kids' imaginations?

Now make your own:

Dialogue is the words that characters say. In graphic novels, many of the words included are the words that characters are speaking. The pictures tell the rest of the story. In chapter books, there is dialogue, too, but there are also sentences and paragraphs to describe places, feelings, and what is happening.

There are many panels in the story that have no words at all like on pages 34-37. Try writing a line for each of the panels with words that describe what is happening. How spooky can you make your descriptions? Can you find other panels with no words and add descriptions to them?

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
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

Make a bar graph to show the results. Have a discussion about it and then vote again. Did the results change?





You can try another kind of graph with guessing what could be in the box in Mrs. Jeepers basement or what happened in the hall with Eddie. Break everyone into groups to discuss what could be in the box or what could have happened in the hallway. Use this type of column graph to chart what everyone thinks. You may have many columns for all the ideas!

Research how to make paper airplanes and have a flight contest. What type of planes fly the farthest? Does the type of paper matter?


Have a bubble party. Can you make your own bubble wand and bubble solution?

Folklore Fun:

Vampires and other characters like leprechauns, sea monsters, and the Frankenstein Monster are part of folklore; stories that are passed down from one generation to another. Different types of folklore stories include fairy tales, folktales, tall tales, fables, and myths.

To do:

Encourage students to create their own folklore stories. Perhaps a tall tale about the kid who won every single race at field day? Or maybe a myth about how the giant maple tree that shades the playground is really a hidden doorway to the land of gnomes. Or how about a fable about the kid who never believed he had to do homework? Or a fairy tale about how your teacher is really a ...um...maybe it would be better if you decided that!




